Daisy Scholarship for 4-H Shooting Sports

Each year Daisy supports 4-H Shooting Sports with two \$500 scholarships for high school seniors. Scholarship application is due April/May. See below for details. For more information please contact Sherrie at speterson@co.hunterdon.nj.us



The scholarship contest generally has a shooting component and also a written component on safety, etc.

- 1. Minimum of a 3.0 GPA from your high school
- 2. Three years participation in 4-H shooting sports
- 3. Recommendation of HS counselor or principal
- 4. Recommendation of 4-H coach or equivalent who is not a relative
- 5. Scholarship would be payable to any two-year or four-year accredited Jr. College, College or University
- 6. Applicant required to submit personal resume
- 7. Application would require a 250 500 word essay about "How participation in the 4-H Shooting Sports better prepared them for college and for life."
- 8. Certified copy of high school transcript.
- 9. Scholarship money would be available in the second semester of the freshman year and can be used for books, housing, and or college fees.
- 10. The scholarship of \$500.00 will be awarded at the National 4-H Shooting Sports Championships each year (you do not need to be at the Championships to receive this scholarship).
- 11. Application and due date will be available soon.

Gladys "Beth" Pool Memorial Scholarship

The Gladys "Beth" Pool Memorial Scholarship was established in 2021 to honor the memory of Beth Pool. Beth was dairy farmer and an agricultural advocate from Gloucester County. Alongside her husband and family, Beth owned and operated Sebowisha Farms, a dairy farm where they milked Holsteins and raised their own crops. Beth's passion for the agricultural industry was evident when she gave farm tours for school children to learn and experience the world of agriculture.

Any high school senior who has participated in New Jersey 4-H or FFA, and is interested in pursuing a career in agriculture, is eligible for this \$1000 Scholarship. Students interested must submit the completed application along with an essay on how agriculture "feeds your soul" and a letter of recommendation from a 4-H Leader or FFA Advisor. The application, essay and letter are due by April 1st. The Scholarship winner will be selected and notified by April 30th. Please contact speterson@co.hunterdon.nj.us for an application.






2022 Summer Camp Season...A note from camp

New Jersey 4-Hers Win the North American Dairy Educational Experience

The North American Dairy Educational Experience (NADEE) was held in October 2021. Hunterdon and Somerset County 4-H members made up the New Jersey Team. This particular event was based on teams responses to a farm scenario. The teams had to research, evaluate and write up a response and had one week to submit their response.

The 4-H members on the team could communicate with each other in person, on the phone, or electronically. They could use written sources (books and magazines) to support their suggested improvements to the farm scenarios. However, they were not allowed to consult advisers, other 4-Hers, or industry professionals, when evaluating the farm scenarios or when providing feedback. They received a new scenario every two weeks, so the contest was spread over a three-month window. All the teams completed challenging scenarios focused on topics like dairy nutrition, animal health, and herd management

Participating in the dairy scenario taught me how much goes on behind the scene on a dairy farm — Carlee Roell, Lebanon, NJ, 11th grade, 7th year in the dairy project.

What I learned from the dairy scenario was how much practical math it takes to keep the dairy operation running — Cholee Roell, Lebanon, NJ, 11th grade, 7th year in the dairy project.

The dairy scenario experience taught me that farmers are some of the greatest problem solvers and that dairy cattle nutrition is a lot more complex than I would've thought — Annabelle Majorossy, Flemington NJ, 10th grade, 7th year in the dairy project.

Thirty-four (34) 4-H members representing eight (8) clubs from seven (7) counties (Burlington, Cumberland, Hunterdon, Mercer, Monmouth, Somerset, Warren) participated in the 2022 NJ 4-H Goat Extravaganza on Saturday, February 12 in Ewing. The event included goat-themed art exhibits in three categories (88 entries), a poster-presentation contest (10 teams), skillathon (8 stations), and a quiz bowl (28 questions per match – one-on-one and toss-up).
